# Getting Organised For Class

## Dictionary

Although Chinese-English dictionaries are available in class, at Higher level it's highly recommended that you buy your own dictionary so you can practise using it at home. A Collins Chinese dictionary and grammar is perfect.



## **Textbooks**

Just like at National 5 there is no prescribed textbook for Higher, but you will receive a number of booklets and worksheets from your teacher. It's very important to keep things filed neatly and in the correct place.

#### Folder

Please make sure you have a lever arch file with dividers, and bring it to every lesson. You can keep your folder in class if you don't have a locker. Make sure you file loose paper away in the correct section of your folder at the end of each lesson.

You should label the dividers in your folder as follows:

- 1. Course Information
- 2. Grammar
- 3. Society
- 4. Learning
- 5. Employability
- 6. Culture
- 7. Directed Writing
- 8. Folio and Essay Writing
- 9. Performance (Talking)
- 10. Exam Practice



# Well-Organised Notes

Independent note-taking and well-organised notes are the key to success at Higher. Pupils who take their own reference notes, without having to be reminded, are the most successful. Make sure your notes are clear and easy to read over and refer back to. This will help you to make the most of your time in class, enhance your learning and save on valuable revision time as exams approach.

## Vocabulary

It's your responsibility to actively learn and revise new vocabulary. Keep a blank piece of paper at the front of the four context sections (3, 4, 5, and 6) to write down new vocabulary related to that section as you come across it. You should keep a similar piece of paper at the front of your folder for noting any generic vocabulary.



You should make a habit of reading over these vocabulary notes once a week. It won't take long, but will hugely enhance your working knowledge of the language and therefore your overall performance. It will also save on revision time at the end of the year.

## Reading

- o in a joint exam with directed writing
- o overall exam time: 2 hours, spend 1 hour and 20 minutes on reading
- o dictionary allowed
- $\circ$  one text of 550-650 words
- $\circ\;$  questions and answers in English
- o overall understanding question
- o translation into English from the text use 10 minutes to get 10 marks

# Directed Writing

- $\circ$  in a joint exam with reading
- o overall exam time: 2 hours, spend 40 minutes on directed writing
- o dictionary allowed
- choice of 2 scenarios, writing about a past experience related to speaking
  Spanish
- o must answer 6 bullet points if you don't, you will be penalised
- o you should write 150-180 words

#### Folio

- o completed in class under exam conditions
- o respond to prompt using 200 250 words
- o writing is mainly discursive
- o allowed dictionary, word list and verb tables
- o first sitting: draft writing
- second sitting: improving on corrections from teacher's marking code, writing final copy

## Listening

- o in an exam
- o exam time: 30 minutes
- no dictionary allowed
- o listen to a monologue and answer questions worth 8 marks
- o listen to a dialogue and answer questions worth 12 marks
- o questions and answers in English
- o you will hear each recording twice

## **Talking**

- o recorded conversation between pupil and class teacher
- o conversation length: approximately 10 minutes
- conversation is on at least two different contexts
- o you can use five headings of no more than eight words each as prompts
