- Unique account with username and password



UCAS: Key Information



- Understanding UCAS deadlines is really important to allow you to plan your time and ensure you are submitting the best application you can
- There are firm UCAS deadlines, but please note that <u>school's deadline will be earlier</u>
- School deadlines are there to support your child and make sure they're on track with their application

UCAS Deadlines for 2024:

- Monday 16th October 2024, 6pm (Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Medicine, Oxbridge)
- Wednesday 31st January 2024, 6pm (Equal Consideration Deadline)
- Conservatoires may be earlier

UCAS: Key Information



- There is a fee that must be paid in order for you to submit your UCAS application
- £27.50 same fee for one choice or more than one choice
- It is paid just before an application is submitted to UCAS





Have you been in care?

Select yes if you've ever lived in public care or as a looked-after child, including:

- with foster carers under local authority care
- in a residential children's home
- being 'looked after at home' under a supervision order
- living with friends or relatives in kinship care

Have you been in care? — under local authority supervision, kinship care, foster care etc. Does not mean work in care sector or unpaid care

Profile: Diversity & Inclusion

Note: This does not refer to time spent in boarding schools, working in a care or healthcare setting, or if you are a carer yourself. Please note that eligibility for support may differ between higher education providers – we strongly recommend contacting the student support team in advance of making an application

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Nominated access

Do you want someone else to be able to act, or speak on your behalf, about your application? e.g. A parent, teacher, other relative or guardian. If you are using an agent, you can choose to enter their details.

You're able to enter details of someone you're happy to help manage your application - this is called nominated access.



Full name of nominee *

The first and last name of your nominee. They will be asked this information when speaking to UCAS on your behalf.

Relationship to you *

How you know your nominee. They will be asked this information when speaking to UCAS on your behalf.

Nominated access – we cannot talk to parents, guardians etc unless they have been nominated.

Profile: Contact and Residency Details

Every year, over 60,000 students with a physical and/or mental health condition, long-term illness, or learning difference apply through UCAS to study at a university or college in the UK, and access a range of support available to help with their studies, day-to-day activities, travel, or lifestyle. 

- 5 different course choices these can be a variety of different courses and universities
- There are some exceptions:
 - Oxford OR Cambridge
 - Only 4 choices for Medicine, Veterinary, Dentistry
- Why not use all 5 options? Remember to think carefully about course choices
- Same personal statement for all 5 choices
 - Look at the following example can both applicants write a suitable personal statement?

Education

- All current and previous qualifications
- Remember check entry requirements for grades required, essential subjects, National 5 requirements

Employment

- Paid employment only
- Provides additional information any employment or experience relevant to your application should be talked about in your personal statement

Things to consider



First impressions count!

Spelling, grammar, email addresses, tone – think of the audience

Should enhance your application

Don't waste characters repeating information

Consider course choices

Remember – 1 personal statement for all courses

Gap year?

Must be <u>own</u> work

This will be checked!

Why is the personal statement important?



- To shortlist applicants some courses have an interview process or a second stage
- For applicants to stand out lots of students may apply to our most popular courses with the same grades – personal statement helps us get to know you better especially if there's no interview and check you are motivated and interested in your subject
- To check work experience for some courses, we might expect you to have completed some paid or voluntary work experience
- To help for future applications can be adapted for college applications, cover letters



Skills required for Business Studies	My skills
Subject knowledge	Went to a subject taster day at University – attended a lecture and learned study skills
Leadership and team work	Volunteered at a school careers fair. Learned about different local employers and trained younger pupils volunteering
Time management	Training with football team 3 x week alongside Highers

Next steps



4 possible outcomes:

- Unconditional offer
- Conditional offer
- Interview
- Unable to make an offer

Once you hear back from ALL of your choices (June 2024)

- 1 x FIRM acceptance (1st choice)
- 1 x INSURANCE choice
- Decline all other offers



How can I support my young person?





- Encourage them to think about their strengths and weaknesses
- Attend Open Days together many include Parent/Carer Sessions
- Be aware of school UCAS deadlines
- Help young people prepare practically for university – budgeting, time management, resilience
- Look into Plan Bs and Cs together
